







Historic newspapers in Year 5


















A Night of Adventure Films






Sumosan Twiga Sushi Masterclass







However, the head chef, Bubker Belkhit, specialises in the Japanese cuisine and he decided in lockdown to start offering sushi making masterclasses. Not many authentic Japanese restaurants offer this, so I decided to seize the opportunity.

It was his first masterclass, but he was still a great teacher, nonetheless. He helped guide us through the process and helped us quickly to get the hang of it. We made four



different types of sushi: cucumber maki rolls; california rolls; philadelphia rolls and spicy tuna rolls. I could tell that by the end the rolling of the sushi had improved a lot.

The hardest part was probably cutting the sushi, and for that you needed a very sharp and wet knife to be able to slice through the many ingredients. The restaurant provided us with all of the ingredients in advance and they even gave us extra, so I made more once the class had finished. The thing that I loved about the homemade sushi is that it is tailormade for you. For example, some people might not like a lot of wasabi, but some would like a lot. At home, the sushi will taste how you like it.












A talented artists in the Squirrels and Robins








Mythical creatures in Year 3

Year 3 had to draw and label mythical creatures this week for homework. There are some excellent illustrations here.
















Year 4 used their golden time to explore the new treehouse in the sunshine












Year 3's rhyming poems








Year 6 have been designing innovative packaging


