The new Year 8 IPQ project was launched today with a visiting speaker leading a session on time management and working to deadlines, both essential skills to cultivate for success in all our work.

We started our week considering the importance of sustainability. The Beekeeping team presented a fascinating assembly about their work with the St John's bees. Members of the Eco Club then encouraged us to think about food waste. The boys spoke with confidence and conviction on subjects they are passionate about.

Younger boys have been truck modelling, learning about the colour wheel and how to calculate change when shopping. Prep boys have been enjoying a range of inspiring activities in English from the Year 6 Dragon's Den robot project to critical skills work in Year 8.



Our environment

Here at St John's, we are always thinking about sustainability. On Monday, our bee-keepers talked to us about what they do to help the bees at St John's. They have learnt how to combine hives and made fondant as a winter treat for the bees when food is scarce. Mr Lawrence is hoping to recruit new members to the club. Eco Club focused their presentation on food waste. They told us that 1.3 million tons of food are wasted each year worldwide. A quarter of this food could feed all 795 million undernourished people in the world. We are all making a big effort not to waste food at lunchtime in school and to take only what we can eat.








Enquiring minds

In DT&E this week the boys used a question matrix to think critically about a Kiwi Co model. We went on to find out how looking to nature can solve many of the engineering problems of today.













Dragons' Den scenario in English

In English this week, Year 6 students enhanced their speaking, listening, presentation and communication skills, as they pitched their robot project ideas to their teachers and peers in a 'Dragons' Den' scenario. As part of their pitch preparation, they used innovative thinking by designing a robot prototype, preparing a print or video advertisement for their target audience, writing a letter to their investors and even creating 3-D designs. Above all, boys' fairness and collegiality shone through.












Innovative English teaching in Year 8

Year 8 have been using critical thinking skills, observations and analysis to examine personality traits of the characters in 'Frankenstein' by Mary Shelley. The boys compared the characters to certain objects in a box, actively conceptualising and synthesising information about the story. Then, using these ideas in an analytical, abstract and creative way, they devised a matching game to arrive at more solid links, clearer understanding and more precise conclusions about the story. In their English into drama sessions, they explored the idea that 'Frankenstein' and his monster are the two sides of the same human, the outer and the inner self. They used movement, height, facial expression and detailed body positioning to explore this concept.

Meanwhile, other boys from our Senior department are 'caught up' in an engaging web of discussion as they debated whether "footballers should be paid more than doctors".


